

Michael made the call and the owner said that as long as we have our train tickets he would hold the Mustang with nothing down. On 12/2/2025 we took Amtrak to Portland arriving in the morning, then we took an Uber out to MMLM. After a preliminary walk around we went next door for breakfast and one last discussion.

The car dealership is connected to a Betty Boop diner with more Betty Boop memorabilia than you can imagine. I was happy to see it was still in business, I always enjoyed eating there. While enjoying breakfast the owner of MMLM came over, introduced himself and bought our breakfast. He said he didn't care if we bought the Mustang or not, he was impressed that we took the train out to see it. He knew he'd sell it, so there was no pressure.



Back in the showroom we did a detailed walk through, ran the top up and down, and inspected the vehicle inside and out. I took a video, sent it to a friend who shared it with another friend and gave us a thumbs up. Then it was time for a test drive. Luckily it had stopped raining! Everything lined up and we made the deal. We were pleased to find complete records of all maintenance, including a professionally made car show sign. This car was purchased from a Ford dealership in Greene, Iowa. Of course, it's no longer there. The Mustang had been in one family and handed down from father to two sons.

We arranged to have the car shipped through MMLM. On 12/9/2025 we received a call that our Mustang was on the way and should arrive late afternoon. Late afternoon got later and later and no car. We started to worry and called the shipping company, but they were closed and we didn't have a number for the driver. Needless, to say it was a sleepless night imagining all kinds of scenarios. We questioned if we would ever see the car again. We were able to reach the company early the next morning, they got in touch with the driver and found out he had checked into a motel instead of driving straight through. The driver arrived early that morning. He was Russian and the only word of English he spoke was “car”. We welcomed our Mustang home on December 10, 2025. What a relief!!

Our Mustang is in excellent condition, but we would like to add original power steering. The horn needs to be fixed, and we'd like to have a mechanic thoroughly go through it and check it out.

# Fire Displaces IEMC Family

*Editor's Note: The following is from an email I received recently from member Joel Collie. With his permission, I am sharing this story so that we might be moved to support him and his family in prayer, and materially as we learn more about what the family will need as they recover from this devastating event.*

On the morning of February 16, around 4:22 a.m., our neighbors called to tell us our house was on fire. We were traveling to visit family in Clarkston, Washington, because we had a long weekend for the Presidents' Day holiday. Whenever we have a long weekend, we try to do something fun. I work for a credit union, so we always have federal holidays off.

My wife woke me up and told me the house was on fire. When I heard that, I fell out of bed in disbelief and could not even understand what was happening. While we were on the call with our neighbors, the police and firefighters arrived within about five minutes to secure the area and start putting out the fire.



The fire started in the garage and quickly destroyed everything inside. It then spread toward the house. We have an attached garage, and our main bedroom is on the other side. The firewall did its job, so the fire did not get into our room. Instead, it went straight into the attic and burned through everything in its path. The firefighters attacked the fire from the front and the back, knocking it down within minutes, but the damage was already done. Most of the trusses burned or were badly charred, and insurance said it will be a total rebuild or a full gut.

Because of the quick actions of our neighbors and the firefighters' quick response, the structure was saved, but we still lost a lot. Everything in our garage is gone, including



things that cannot be replaced, like memories, pictures, keepsakes, and our child's firsts. We also lost two vehicles and our travel trailer.

One of the vehicles we lost was my 2015 Ford Mustang GT Premium in Deep Impact Blue. It was parked in the garage for the winter, and I was excited to take it out soon since we had had a mild winter and the weather was improving. I had it scheduled for two recalls, new tires, and a tune-up this spring for the trips we had planned. We also lost my Ford F-350, which was the workhorse of our family, along with our travel trailer. Everything we had planned for this spring and summer went up in smoke.

We are very lucky to have my wife's SUV with us. My commuter vehicle was parked behind the travel trailer, so it was protected from damage, and we both still have vehicles to drive while we figure out the next steps.

Most importantly, we are all safe, including our dog. We have generous family members who are letting us stay with them while we learn what life will look like during the rebuild, which could take 6 to 12 months. We are thankful we were not home when the fire started, because I do not know what we would have done. Things can be replaced, but people cannot, and I understand that more than ever now.



Please pray for my family as we go through this hard time. If you want to reach out, we would appreciate it. Even though I am not heavily involved with the club, I know I have your support, and I truly appreciate being part of the group. I may not have a Mustang right now, but I will again someday, and I still support the Mustang and the place it holds in my life and in American history.

## Flashback: Mustang Starts at 1964 World's Fair



Most of you will remember the dawning of the muscle car era and all the hype revolving around Ford's new pony car and the subsequent offerings from its competitors. One of the most effective methods to generate excitement and promote sales of those cars and the cars of the future was the New York Worlds fair in April of 1964.

The American Big Three car manufactures went all-in by spending the equivalent of \$1.1 billion of today's dollars building elaborate displays, venues and activities. Ford even created an attraction where people boarded Ford Galaxy convertibles which were circulated through a Disneyland "Small World"-like ride, complete with the recorded voice of Walt Disney narrating the history of the earth, which included a vision for the future depicting prototype cars that look more like The Jetsons' space car than a realistic automobile.

GM's pavilion covered 1.5 acres and featured a follow-up from their 1939 World's Fair Futurama presentation with the new Futurama II attraction that took riders on a trip to the moon.

Not to be outdone, Chrysler created a 6-acre artificial lake and populated it with 5 islands. The display was touted as "a fair within a fair" and featured things like super-sized cars, a 100' long animated engine and a 10-story rocket.

The 1964 World's fair was perfectly timed with the resurgence of America's love for cars and the call of the freedom of the road. It was a big deal, so big in fact, that The Beatles even made an appearance. Despite all of that, the iconic Mustang is still remembered as the real star of the show.

Kudos to Ford for it's continued commitment to the pony car that changed the automotive world and continues to set the standard for style and performance.


